

lie but it is only the wise people who choose to tell the truth even if it means they experience discomfort. God gifts us wisdom so that we are able to live our lives well and in right relationships!



Suzanne was a wise woman who from a young age wanted to live out her beliefs by joining a religious community. Her journey bought her to New Zealand where she worked with vulnerable children/adults and sick people in Auckland, Wellington and Hiruharama. She worked alongside the Māori community, learning the language and sharing their knowledge. Suzanne was able to see where the needs in the community were and she had the courage to do something about it. The impact she had on her community was so great that her funeral was the largest ever celebrated for a New Zealand woman.
